What is occupational therapy?

- "Occupation" = meaningful everyday activity
- Use everyday life activities (occupations) to promote health, well-being, and your ability to participate in the important activities in your life
- Occupational therapy assistants work under supervision of an occupational therapist
- Work with clients (individuals, groups, or populations) across the lifespan in a variety of settings (home, school, health care facilities)
- Healthcare profession regulated in all 50 states, Washington, DC, Puerto Rico, Guam, America Samoa, Northern Mariana Islands
- Covered by Medicare, Medicaid, private payers



Who are we?

- AOTA represents more than 230,000 occupational therapists, occupational therapy assistants, and occupational therapy students in the United States and beyond, to advance occupational therapy practice, education, and research.

State Advocacy

- Working closely with state associations is a priority
- State occupational therapy associations in 50 states, Washington, DC & Puerto Rico
 Affiliates, not chapters
- Affiliated State Association Presidents (ASAP) group

 Steering committee of past presidents
 - Chair is liaison to Board of Directors
 - Vice Chair is liaison to Representative Assembly
 - Staff liaison is Vice President of State Affairs & Health Policy



State Advocacy

- Communicate policy priorities & reports of legislative & regulatory issues being tracked to state presidents, advocacy leaders, & lobbyists
- Host periodic webinars on major issues
- Zoom calls on state-specific issues
- ASAP Annual Meeting
- Email listserve for ASAP members
- Online message board community

State regulatory agencies issue state licenses, set and enforce practice standards.

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How do I get in "The Room Where it Happens"?

- Boards might meet regularly, might not
- Staff work for multiple boards or Board might regulate multiple professions
- Natural adversarial relationship
- Staff aren't occupational therapy practitioners
- Need to request time on a meeting agenda in advance
- Board counsel might discourage communication



How I Got "In The Room Where it Happens"

Get informed.

Asked to be added to email distribution list or how to know about upcoming meetings.





Share/create resources.

Official documents, licensing resources, webinars, etc.



Reach out.

Identified staff contact, introduced myself, & briefly described my role

Attend meetings.

Showed up in person or remotely, even if it's just to listen.



How I Got in "The Room Where it Happens"

- Be patient
 - olt's not going to happen overnight
- Be tenacious • But not pesky
- Be assertive
 - $\odot\,\text{Don't}$ be afraid to show up
- Be a resource
 - $_{\odot}$ How can I/AOTA help you do your job?
