

# **About This Presentation**

- House and Senate committee leadership is mostly set
- Top spots on several key House panels changed following retirements, term limits, and challenges
  - GOP conference term limits and retirements drove changes on the Republican side
  - New top Democrats successfully challenged some senior committee ranking members
- Senate Republicans assume committee chairs
  - Some GOP assignments shuffled due to retirements and party rules
  - Democrats filled openings on seven panels after retirements and election losses

# Several New GOP Committee Chairs Have Taken Gavels



### **Energy & Commerce**

- **Brett Guthrie (Ky.)** elected to lead <u>E&C panel</u>; had chaired the Health subcommittee
- Replacing retired Chairwoman Cathy McMorris Rodgers (Wash.)
- Frank Pallone (N.J.) staying on as ranking member



# **Foreign Affairs**

- **Brian Mast (Fla.)** won a crowded race to lead the full committee; had chaired Oversight subcommittee
- Former Chairman Michael McCaul (Texas) didn't seek a waiver for a fourth term
- Ranking Democrat Gregory Meeks (N.Y.) returns to his spot in 2025





### **Education & Workforce**

- Tim Walberg (Mich.) won the race to chair the committee in the 119th Congress
- Outgoing chair Virginia Foxx (N.C.) was limited by GOP conference rules
- Bobby Scott (Va.) returns as ranking member



### **Financial Services**

- French Hill (Ark.) <u>defeated several challengers</u> for the Financial Services gavel; had chaired Digital Assets subcommittee
- Replacing retired Chairman Patrick McHenry (N.C.)
- Maxine Waters (Calif.) returns as panel's top Democrat

# **New Faces Replace Longtime Democrats Atop Committees**



### **Agriculture**

- Angie Craig (Minn.) defeated incumbent ranking member David Scott (Ga.), fellow challenger Jim Costa (Calif.) to serve as top Democrat
- Glenn Thompson (Pa.) serving another term as the panel's chairman



### **Natural Resources**

- Jared Huffman (Calif.), who had been ranking member on Water subcommittee, <u>defeated</u> Melanie Stansbury (N.M.) for top spot
- Huffman had challenged Raúl Grijalva (Ariz.), who endorsed Stansbury
- Bruce Westerman (Ark.) remains chairman



# **Judiciary**

- Jamie Raskin (Md.) ran uncontested to be the panel's top Democrat after incumbent Jerry Nadler (N.Y.) dropped out
- Raskin's move opened spot on Oversight committee
- Jim Jordan (Ohio) returns as chairman



### **Oversight**

- Longtime panel member Gerry Connolly (Va.) <u>elected</u> <u>by Democrats</u> to replace Raskin
- Defeated Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez (N.Y.) in steering and full caucus meetings
- James Comer (Ky.) remains chairman



# Several Names Were in the Mix to Lead Rules Committee

### **House Rules Committee**

- Chairman will be chosen by Speaker Mike Johnson, who may make his pick today
- New chair will follow Michael Burgess (Texas), who retired after the 118th Congress
- The Rules panel sets the terms for floor debate, a key step to advancing leadership's agenda
- Jim McGovern (Mass.) set to remain top Democrat



Michelle Fischbach (Minn.): Third in seniority on panel, serving since 2021



Chip Roy (Texas): House Freedom Caucus member, supports agreement to keep three hard-right members on the panel



Virginia Foxx (N.C.): Served as vice chair on the committee from 2013 to 2017



**Pete Sessions (Texas):** Served as Rules chair from 2013 to 2019, including start of Trump's first term



**Nick Langworthy (N.Y.):** Has been floated as a possible candidate, is eighth in seniority on committee

# Top Committee Spots Shuffled as Republicans Assumed Majority



## **Energy & Natural Resources**

- Mike Lee (Utah) who had been the top Republican on the Public Lands Subcommittee — is now chairman of the full panel
- Ranking member in the 118th Congress John Barrasso (Wyo.) now serves as majority whip



# **Judiciary**

- Chuck Grassley (Iowa) moves from ranking Republican on the Budget panel to resume his former gavel at Senate Judiciary
- Has two years remaining on his term as chairman under GOP conference rules



### Intelligence

- Tom Cotton (Ark.) takes the panel's gavel as the most senior returning member
- Ranking member in the 118<sup>th</sup> Congress Marco Rubio (Fla.) named as president-elect Donald Trump's pick for Secretary of State



# **Budget**

- Lindsey Graham (S.C.) the top Republican on Judiciary in the 118th Congress — replaces Grassley to take Budget gavel
- Will have important role in overseeing budget reconciliation process in the Senate



### **Rules & Administration**

- Former GOP leader Mitch McConnell (Ky.) takes Rules gavel, giving him an important role shaping Senate floor procedures
- Will also chair the Appropriations panel's Defense Subcommittee



# Aging

 Rick Scott (Fla.) replaces retired top Republican Mike Braun (Ind.), who didn't seek reelection

# **Retirements Created Openings for Top Democratic**



### **Agriculture**

- Amy Klobuchar (Minn.) replaces retired former chairwoman Debbie Stabenow (Mich.), who didn't seek reelection to the 119th Congress
- Left spot as the top Democrat on the Senate Rules & Administration panel



### **Rules & Administration**

 Alex Padilla (Calif.) chosen to replace Klobuchar as the top Democrat on the committee



### **Environment & Public Works**

- Sheldon Whitehouse (R.I.) moves from chairing Budget panel to become EPW ranking member
- Replaces retired Sen. Tom Carper (Del.)



## **Budget**

• Jeff Merkley (Ore.) serves as ranking member on the committee



# **Foreign Relations**

- Jeanne Shaheen (N.H.) selected as the panel's top Democrat following retirement of incumbent Ben Cardin (Md.)
- Left opening atop the Senate Small Business panel



### **Small Business**

Ed Markey (Mass.) replaces Shaheen on the committee

# **Banking, Housing, & Urban Affairs**

- Longtime banking industry critic Elizabeth Warren (Mass.) is the panel's top Democrat
- Chairman in the 118th Congress, Sherrod Brown (Ohio), lost reelection to Republican Bernie Moreno



# **Energy & Natural Resources**

- Martin Heinrich (N.M) replaces retiring committee chairman Joe Manchin (I-W.Va.) as the panel's ranking member
- Heinrich didn't hold a gavel on any committee in the 118th Congress



### **Veterans' Affairs**

- Richard Blumenthal (Conn.) is committee's ranking member
- Former chairman Jon Tester (Mont.) lost his reelection bid for a fourth term to Republican Tim Sheehy



# **Aging**

- Kirsten Gillibrand (N.Y.) chosen to replace Pennsylvania's Bob Casey atop the special committee
- Casey lost his race against Republican Dave McCormick
