Q&A with Pat Leonard, 2015 PAC Chairman.

Pat Leonard is President of McKesson Business Performance Services and the incoming PAC Board Chairman. Below he answers common questions about the PAC and speaks about his new role.

First off, what is a PAC?

“At a high level, a PAC, or political action committee, is an organization that raises money to help elect candidates to political office. They are typically utilized in federal elections. Some states allow PAC contributions to state-level candidates as well.”

Why does McKesson have a PAC and what does it do?

“McKesson has a PAC because corporations are prohibited by law from making political contributions to candidates for federal office.

Our PAC raises voluntary funds from eligible McKesson employees and then donates those funds to the campaigns of candidates who are aligned with McKesson’s values and our vision for the future of healthcare.”

Why did you decide to become involved with the PAC?

“I am a member because the PAC gives the McKesson community a voice in important elections.

Healthcare is a heavily regulated industry and McKesson has a complex relationship with the government. Not only do they regulate our business but they are also our largest customer. It is critical that we, as employees, have a voice in who represents us in Washington and in the state capitols.”

Why should McKesson employees join the PAC?

“Politics and public policy issues affect not only the work we do, but also our everyday lives. The PAC gives our employees a voice by helping elect candidates who share our common values and commitment to better health.

The more employees who participate, the louder McKesson’s voice will be in elections across the country. Contributions to the PAC are limited to \$5,000 per person per year. For our PAC to be successful it is critical that we have a strong base of employee support.”

How is the money employees contribute to the PAC spent?

“Every dollar we raise goes directly to help elect candidates.

My PAC Board colleagues and I evaluate candidates for support based on a set of nonpartisan criteria that represent the values and interests of the company.”

What will be your main focus in your new role as PAC Chairman?

“My goal is to increase employee engagement in the PAC and build on our strong 2014 fundraising numbers.”

2014: A year of growth.



Increased participation.

Nearly 100 new members joined the McKesson Employees' PAC in 2014. With over 15,000 employees eligible to contribute, there is still room to grow. However, the current trend of new memberships puts the PAC on the right path towards a competitive company-wide participation rate.

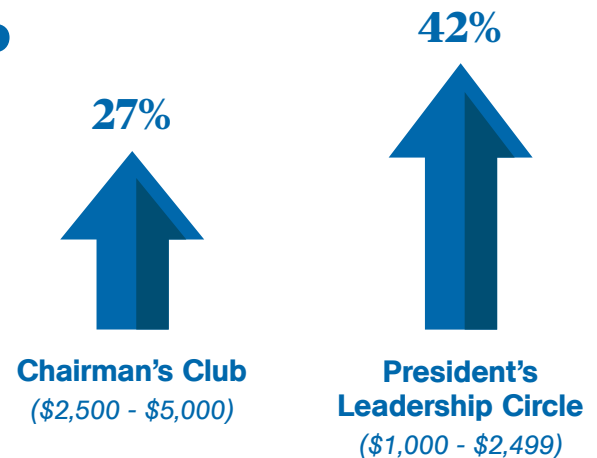
Strong fundraising.

In 2014, McKesson employees contributed \$555,960 to the McKesson Employees' PAC, a \$28,000 increase over the previous year.

Successful fundraising was driven, in part, by greater emphasis on creative outreach strategies to existing members and eligible contributors. McKesson employees pledged over \$107,000 during the 2014 PAC Sweepstakes compared to \$58,000 in 2013. McKesson's Senior Leaders also increased their commitment to the PAC last year. Executives pledged nearly \$60,000 in contributions at their annual strategy meeting alone.

Contributions at the top two giving levels increased substantially in 2014, indicating stronger employee interest in the McKesson PAC. Chairman's Club level contributions (\$2,500 - \$5,000) rose over 25% and President's Leadership Circle contributions (\$1,000 - \$2,499) grew over 40%.

Election center.



The 2014 midterm elections.

The 2014 midterm election included the most closely contested Senate races in over a decade. In November, Republicans won nine out of the 11 competitive races and began the 114th Congress holding 54 seats, and the majority, in that chamber.

In the House of Representatives, Republicans gained 13 seats, padding their majority to historic levels.

Over the next two years, the GOP-controlled Congress will need to show voters they can compromise and govern effectively. Otherwise, they risk losing seats in 2016, when the electoral map will favor Democrats vying for office in the Senate.

The Republican wave also swept through the states. The GOP added to their already sizeable majority by winning gubernatorial races in four traditionally Democratic states, giving GOP governors a 31-18 edge over their Democratic counterparts (Alaska elected Bill Walker, an Independent). Additionally, three out of five state legislatures are now controlled by the GOP.

What's next? The 2016 elections.

The political spotlight is already on the race for the Oval Office in 2016. Several high-profile names are being thrown around in both parties, though no one has officially declared their candidacy.

At this early stage, the GOP field is more unpredictable with possible candidates including former Governors Jeb Bush and Rick Perry; Governors Scott Walker and Chris Christie; and Senators Rand Paul, Marco Rubio and Ted Cruz. On the Democratic side, it is widely believed that former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton will run and be a party favorite, though Vice President Joe Biden, former Senator Jim Webb, and former Maryland Governor Martin O'Malley are among others who are mentioned as possible candidates.

In the Senate, the GOP will have to fight to hold on to their majority. Republican Senators will have to defend 24 seats up for election while the Democrats will be defending ten seats. Additionally, in Presidential election years the Democratic base tends to turn out in higher numbers than during the midterm elections, adding another hurdle for the GOP in 2016.

Politics will be front and center next year, as both parties eye the 2016 election for the White House and control of the Senate.

114th Congress: issues and priorities.

Republicans now control Congress, but face a President willing to use his veto pen.

The new Congress is an opportunity for the GOP to pass legislation addressing its top priorities and define its reputation heading into the 2016 Presidential election. Republicans will have to decide if they want to be seen as a party that is able to govern, requiring them to work with President Obama and the Democrats, or as the party that stands firm on its ideals, running the risk of being blamed for gridlock in Washington. With many must-pass pieces of legislation in 2015, expect some difficult conversations, and perhaps interesting compromises, between the two branches.



High profile policy priorities of the new Republican Congress.

The 114th Congress is already underway. Here's what to expect in 2015:

In response to the President's action on immigration, Republicans have promised to address our nation's immigration laws. Additionally, Congress will be forced to rethink our nation's infrastructure priorities when the current transportation law expires. Environmental policy, trade issues and international affairs will also be at the top of the agenda.

Congress will need to raise the debt ceiling once again as early as this spring. Federal spending, tax policy and healthcare reform will be major pieces of this ongoing fiscal debate.

Will Congress act on any issues affecting McKesson or our customers?

Healthcare Reform.

Repealing or altering the healthcare reform law will be a top GOP priority.

The House and Senate are expected to vote on full repeal of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), but it is unlikely President Obama will sign the legislation.

The GOP will likely try to overturn or tweak parts of the law, especially unpopular provisions with bipartisan support for change. Efforts to alter the mandate for employers to provide health insurance to employees who work at least 30 hours a week and repeal the 2.3% tax on medical devices are expected.

Medicare Sustainable Growth Rate.

If Congress doesn't act by March 31st, physicians face a 21% cut in their Medicare reimbursement rates. Congress has averted the payment cuts (known as the "doc-fix") nearly 20 times in the last ten years. However, delay or repeal of the automatic payment cuts is expensive and legislators must find a way to pay for it.

21st Century Cures Initiative.

The House plans to consider legislation to promote innovation in healthcare. The "21st Century Cures Initiative" is a bipartisan effort to advance progress in the science, technology and delivery of healthcare in the 21st century.

Legislation addressing the regulation of health information technology (IT) and the future of patient data exchange, known as interoperability, may also see a vote in Congress.

Tax Reform.

The President and Congressional leaders have called tax reform an area of potential compromise. In any deal, McKesson will advocate to preserve LIFO (Last-In, First-Out) accounting which is critical to our distribution business.

Healthcare policy in the states.

Expect state legislatures to debate a variety of issues critical to McKesson and our customers.

Healthcare Reform.

States are the key players in implementing the most significant parts of the ACA. In 2015, states running their own insurance exchanges may act to improve consumer experiences and contain costs. There is also renewed debate over Medicaid expansion in a handful of states.

Rx Abuse/Controlled Substances.

Prescription drug abuse will remain a major concern, especially in states struggling with high rates of abuse. Altering the rules for controlled substances, prescription drug monitoring programs and Rx takeback programs could be introduced in an attempt to address the epidemic.

Taxes.

As the economy recovers, states will look at how they can balance their budgets in the new economic environment. Spending and taxes are major pieces of that equation and many states may attempt to make legislative changes. With facilities or customers in every state, state tax policy is critical to McKesson.

Privacy.

States will also continue to look at how their data use and privacy laws impact patients, especially as ACA implementation continues.
