Mid-election cycle update with PAC Chairman, Pat Leonard.

Pat Leonard is President of McKesson Business Performance Services and Chairman of the McKesson Employees' PAC. Below he discusses the PAC's financial results from the first half of the 2015-2016 election cycle and why employee engagement is critical in a presidential election year.



We saw record breaking fundraising in 2015. McKesson employees contributed over \$595,200 – a 7% increase over 2014. This puts the PAC in a great position to increase our support of federal candidates, expand our political footprint at the state level, and continue to support pro-business, solutions-oriented candidates from across the country who are aligned with McKesson's values and our vision for the future of healthcare.

Record breaking fundraising - that's great! What was the Board's strategy?

Contributions to the PAC are limited to \$5,000 per person per year. For our PAC to be successful it's critical that we have a strong base of employee support. The Board's strategy in 2015 was to increase

the engagement of employees at all levels. In 2015, we saw a 13% increase in the number of employees in grades 109 and below who contribute to the PAC.

We are also focused on increasing PAC awareness and participation on the MTS side of the business. Historically, MTS has not been as active as MDS or the corporate functions in both participation and dollars contributed. Last year we launched an employee committee in Alpharetta, Georgia – home of MTS' headquarters – to lead efforts to increase PAC brand awareness and promote employee political engagement.

As a leader in the healthcare industry, why is it important for McKesson to have a strong PAC?

Our business and our customers' future success are heavily tied to public policy and government regulation at the federal, state and local levels. It is critical that McKesson has a strong voice in electing policymakers from both sides of



the aisle who understand the healthcare industry's role in delivering quality, affordable care.

Additionally, many of our competitors in both the distribution and technology industries operate PACs. A strong PAC helps us remain competitive and ensure McKesson's interests are represented in Washington, D.C. and state capitals.

Why is it important for employees to participate in the PAC?

McKesson's shared commitment to leadership through ILEAD tells us that we can all be leaders. That means contributing to the broader goals of each of our businesses and McKesson as a whole. The McKesson Employees' PAC is an important way in which we can all help advocate for McKesson and our customers in the policy and political space.

Election center.

This November, American voters will not only select a new president, they will also cast their votes in 435 House races, 34 United States Senate contests, 12 governors races, as well as countless local elections and on ballot initiatives around the country.

White House

The 2016 race for the Oval Office is turning into one of the most unpredictable races in recent memory, with intra-party contests between the "political establishment" and "outsider" candidates making headlines across the country.

The Republican presidential primary has so far been dominated by "outsider" candidates like businessman Donald Trump and Texas Senator Ted Cruz, while the campaigns of well-known "establishment" candidates like former Florida Governor Jeb Bush, Florida Senator Marco Rubio and New Jersey Governor Chris Christie fell flat with voters in early primary and caucus states. Ohio Governor John Kasich remains the last "establishment" candidate in the race on the GOP side.

Just as a distrust of the political establishment has seemingly overtaken the battle for the Republican nomination, a similar trend is occurring on the Democratic side. Despite a strong start to her campaign and support from the party's political powerhouses, former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton is engaged in a closer than expected race with Independent Vermont Senator Bernie Sanders.

While many originally discounted the outsider candidates in both parties, Mr. Trump and Senators Cruz and Sanders have proven their populist platforms are resonating with Americans in both the GOP and Democratic parties.

U.S. Senate

Senate Democrats enter the 2016 elections with what seems to be a structural

advantage. Despite the GOP's current 54-46 majority in the chamber, only 10 of the 34 Senate seats up for election are held by Democrats – and, of those 10, only Nevada is seen as highly competitive. Of the 24 seats currently held by Republicans four are considered toss ups.

Presidential politics may also play a role in which party is victorious in 2016, as Senate results have been converging with presidential outcomes for years.

U.S. House of Representatives

Republicans came out of the 2014 midterms with their largest majority in the House of Representatives since the early 1920s. Despite Democrats' ability to turn out in large numbers in presidential election years, current Congressional district lines almost ensure the GOP will keep their majority in the House in 2016 – even if a Democrat wins the presidency.

Governors

Twelve states will vote for their chief executive in 2016 and the GOP has the structural advantage in many of these races. Democrats will be defending eight of the governorships up for election, and three of those races will be hotly contested. On the Republican side, only one contest, in North Carolina, is expected to be competitive.

State Legislatures

Eighty-six out of the 99 state legislative chambers are holding elections this year. The GOP currently holds 69 out of the 98 partisan state legislative chambers, which is the highest number in the history of the party.

Healthcare policy issues to watch in 2016.

Many of the healthcare issues that impact McKesson and our customers occur at both the federal and state levels.

Healthcare issues were at the forefront in Washington, D.C. and the states in 2015. Congress permanently fixed the Medicare sustainable growth rate through a bipartisan compromise that ended a decade of short-term patches. Additionally, the House overwhelmingly passed the 21st Century Cures bill which contained provisions to promote health IT interoperability and reform the regulation of health IT products.

Meanwhile, states continued to implement the Affordable Care Act. Thirty-two states expanded Medicaid, with half choosing to operate state-based health insurance exchanges. Consumers fueled debates about what drugs and medical procedures should cost to who should make decisions about coverage.

Despite 2016 being an election year, there is momentum on many important health initiatives, including:

Drug Pricing

Media attention has brought increased focus on price increases for certain drugs, including generic and specialty drugs.

Federal level Drug pricing will continue to be a topic of continuing oversight and investigative hearings on Capitol Hill. The Administration is considering how it can use regulation to curb drug prices in federal healthcare programs. Drug pricing is also a hot topic on the presidential campaign trail.

State level States are considering how to limit spending on prescriptions and increase pricing transparency. This issue has made its way to the November ballot where California and Ohio voters will decide if states should cap drug prices at the rate the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs' pays.

Rx Drug Abuse

Abuse of prescription drugs is a serious problem and has the attention

of policymakers. As a key player in the supply chain, McKesson is committed to working with the healthcare community to promote effective solutions to reduce prescription drug abuse.

Federal level Lawmakers have held multiple oversight hearings and debated major legislation to address this epidemic. Significant congressional activity is expected early in 2016. As with drug pricing, Rx abuse will continue to be a leading issue on the Presidential campaign trail.

State level Governors, attorneys general and state legislators are convening special Rx abuse task forces, improving state prescription drug monitoring programs and tackling Rx take-back programs. The issue continues to evolve with more legislation addressing addiction, treatment and prevention to stem the epidemic.

Interoperability/Connectivity

The exchange of healthcare information can reduce the cost and improve the quality of patient care. McKesson, along with other partners, is working with the Administration, Congressional committees and various state industry leaders, to advance interoperability and the safe and timely exchange of health information across all settings of care.

Federal level McKesson advocated for language to accelerate health IT interoperability in the 21st Century Cures bill which passed the House in July 2015. The Senate is currently considering similar legislation.

State level Sixteen states have introduced legislation to promote the safe exchange of patient data. These bills create information exchange platforms, focus on the interoperability of health records or development of record locators and set standards for patient consent.

Shift to Value Based Healthcare

Avenues to advance high quality care, improve transitions, produce stronger patient outcomes, increase efficiency and reduce costs are critical to shifting to a value-based healthcare system. McKesson is engaged in supporting this shift through the promotion of effective government policies and business solutions.

Federal level The Senate is working to identify solutions to improve care and reduce costs for Medicare beneficiaries. It is also considering legislation that would cover Medicare Part B services provided by pharmacists in medically underserved communities.

State level As states move to value-based reimbursement, "transparency" is an emerging public policy focus. Transparency for consumers – related to drug pricing, the cost of medical services, how treatment decisions are made and who will be covered for what services – is being debated in state capitals.

Taxes

Policymakers in both parties are increasingly focused on simplifying tax codes. Because of our high volume and low margins, McKesson's distribution business would be disproportionately affected by certain changes in federal and state tax laws.

Federal level Despite bipartisan appetite to address the complex U.S. tax code, no legislation was passed in 2015. It is unlikely Congress will agree on major tax reform in an election year, but in any deal, McKesson will advocate to preserve LIFO (last-in, first-out) accounting, which is critical to our distribution business.

State level States continue to look to gross receipts taxes to increase revenue to cover growing expenses. Since 2014, five states introduced gross receipts tax proposals that could significantly impact McKesson's distribution business.


