

- OPHTHPAC represents the profession of ophthalmology to the U.S. Congress and advocates for ophthalmologists and their patients








About the Academy

 - 10 percent were younger than 35








- Annual forum for members to instigate change and shape the profession's future.
- Focus on policy, politics and practice management.
- Events include advocacy day, sessions on health policy and meetings to discuss the status of the profession.
- Attracts Academy leadership and political junkies in addition to the Advocacy Ambassadors.







- Goal of the program is to help young ophthalmologists learn firsthand the importance of membership and staying engaged.
- Residents are sponsored by state ophthalmology societies, subspecialty/specialized interest societies and training programs








Advocacy Ambassador program

- Program began in 2004 with 14 participants
- 2017 broke records with 170 Advocacy Ambassadors
- On average 32% of our fly-in attendees are Advocacy Ambassadors





Advocacy Ambassadors

- "Members in Training"
- Applies to participate in Fall
- Must be members of the Academy and sponsoring organization







Advocacy Ambassadors Training

- Live webinar is offered during the first session of a Congress and the webinar's recording is offered during the second session's attendees
- Congressional Advocacy Day legislative briefing book
- Wednesday night dinner briefing
- Short videos are now being made available





- Ambassadors are paired with experienced advocates for meetings with members of Congress
 - Their sponsoring state's senators and one representative
- Work is being done to make this a more established mentorship program

- Advocacy Ambassadors are encouraged to pledge to bring advocacy home with them by inviting their member of Congress to their facility or coordinating a meeting at the lawmaker's district office.
- Ambassadors are also provided with a slide deck and must present their experience at advocacy day during their Grandrounds.
- Ambassadors are also encouraged to provide a presentation to their sponsoring society.

Advocate for Your Patients

WHY. Connecting locally with your lawmalers provides federal and state officials the opportunity to witness first-hand how physician-led eye care protects sight and empowers lives. By showing them how the Academy's community of ophthalmologists work to provide better health outcomes, you're lebring lawmalers connect the dots between the policies they write and the work you're doing in the field. Share how the Academy's IRSP Registry is helping quality care evolve or let them see how burdensome EHR reporting requirements can be. Show which you and your team are doing to prevent bindness and vision loss, Put a face on the healthcare system by introducing our elected leaders to the patients whose families and lives are changed by quality eye care.

WHERE: These meetings can take place in any number of locations — get creative. Your practice, the lawmaker's office, an ambulatory surgery center or an academic setting are all great spots for advocacy.

WHO: Start with the lawmaker and their staff. Invite your care team and patients to engage with them. Focus on what you are advocating for and put a face on it.

HOW LONG: One of the best things about advocating at home is that lawmakers tend to be more relaxed and informal. Depending on the agends and the day, they can go from half an hour to a longer, hourlong discussion.

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
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Lessons learned

- Develop a strategy to capitalize on the post-fly-in enthusiasm
