EU vs. Member State competencies: Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union

Shared competence

Exclusive competence

"The Union has exclusive competence to make directives and conclude international agreements when provided for in a Union legislative act."

......

- the customs union
- the establishing of the competition rules necessary for the functioning of the internal market
- monetary policy for the Member States whose currency is the euro
- the conservation of marine biological resources under the common fisheries policy
- common commercial policy
- conclusion of certain international agreements

- the internal market
- social policy, for the aspects defined in this Treaty
- · economic, social and territorial cohesion
- agriculture and fisheries, excluding the conservation of marine biological resources
- environment
- consumer protection
- transport

- the area of freedom, security and justice
- common safety concerns in public health matters, for the aspects defined in this Treaty

"Union exercise of competence shall not result in Member States being prevented from exercising theirs in" ...

- research, technological development and (outer) space
- development cooperation, humanitarian aid

"The Union coordinates Member States policies or implements supplemental to theirs common policies, not covered elsewhere"

- coordination of economic, employment and social policies
- common foreign, security and defence policies

Supporting competence

"The Union can carry out actions to support, coordinate or supplement Member States' actions in" ...

- the protection and improvement of human health
- industry
- culture
- tourism
- education, youth, sport and vocational training
- civil protection (disaster prevention)
- administrative cooperation






The European Union Welcomes Input Treaty on European Union (Lisbon Treaty, 2009)

Participative Democracy: Interest representation prescribed by law

- Horizontal civil dialogue (Art. 11(1) TEU, directly to EU institutions) e.g. «Europe for Citizens» 2014-2020
- Vertical civil dialogue (Art. 11(2) TEU) (via national entities)
- **Commission`s consultation practices (**Art. 11(3) TEU) frequent public consultations prior to legislative proposal or int't treaties
- European Citizen's Initiative (Art. 11(4) TEU) since 4/2012: 1m citizens from at least 7 member states

• Transparency Directive:

(only) <u>procedural guarantees</u> for reimbursement decisions. (Council Directive 89/105/EEC)

• Health:

"A <u>high level of human health</u> protection shall be ensured..." (Art. 168 para. 1 TFEU).

Market Access

• Reimbursement:

"...<u>health services</u> and medical care and the allocation of the <u>resources</u> assigned to them. ..." (Art. 168 para. 7 TFEU)

• Health:

"... responsibilities of the member states for the definition of their <u>health policy</u> and for the <u>organisation</u> and delivery of health services and medical care. ..." (Art. 168 para. 7 TFEU)

- Goal: "boost economic growth, job creation, stimulate innovation, contribute to connected digital single market"
- Focus areas:

Example: Joint Action on Chronic Diseases Opportunity to promote best practices across Europe

- EU Strategy 2020 Active and Healthy Aging Innovation Union Strategy
- Joint Action:
 - funding instrument under third EU Health Programme 2014-2020
 - Designed and financed by MS authorities and the EU to address specific priorities
 - On average 25 partners involved
- Example CHRODIS:
 - reducing burden of chronic disease like diabetes, cancer and mental disorders
 - 70 associated and collaborating partners
 - Work packages such as "knowledge"; "health promotion"; "multimorbidity", "Type II diabetes"
- DG Sante:
 - Supports MS by providing comprehensive approach
 - EU Platform
- Associated partners:
 - Health Ministries
 - National institutes of public health and thought leaders
 - ..
- Collaborating Partners expertise and through leadership:
 - Academic institutes


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
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Example: Hepatitis C Epidemic - National Priority









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
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Czech Republic: Better IP Protection and Better Health 060101 + Life expectancy at birth, in years
