What just happened?

→ Already blue New England got bluer still

- High turnout, multi-candidate districts bolstered wave
- **→** Three Republican governors withstood the tide
- **→ No Republican-controlled chambers left standing in New England**



Bucking the Trend - Republican governors in "blue" states










Varied increases in turnout across the region








A True Blue Wave

Maine Gubernatorial Race

- Attorney General Janet Mills (D) will become Maine's first female governor, beating Shawn Moody (R)
- Third-party candidates, break "tie"
- Alan Caron drops out, endorses AG Janet Mills (D) and Terry Hayes (I) under performs history
- Increased Democratic turnout & Republicans loose Independents
- Not affected by ranked-choice recount









Maine State Senate

- Pre-elections 18 Republicans, 17
 Democrats
- Post-election 21 Democrats, 14 Republicans
- New Senate President Troy Jackson
- Progressive Senate Leadership
- Diminished Republican Minority
- New Committees 19 Joint Committees












Maine State House


- Democrats increase advantage from 77 seats to 89 seats out of 151
- Speaker Sara Gideon (D) is the only returning leader in the House
- Republicans will have 57 seats
- 3 Independents, 1 Common Sense Independent, 1 Unenrolled
- Leadership elections on Nov. 14th





Maine's CD 1 re-elects Pingree








Maine's CD 2 goes to "ranked-choice" recount

- Poliquin (R) and Golden (D) tied at 46%
- First use of ranked-choice voting in a federal election
- Recount will be used to redistribute votes for the two other candidates
- Exit poll suggests that Golden should ultimately have enough votes to win via ranked-choice
- Will there be a lawsuit over ranked-choice?





Vermont and New Hampshire

- Both chambers in New Hampshire flip to Democrats
- Both Vermont and New Hampshire now have
 - Democratic legislatures (both House and Senate
 - Republican governors
 - Democratic congressional delegations (except Sanders, an independent who caucuses with the Democrats)







Blue Legislative Wave

New Hampshire Executive Elections

- Sununu wins 2nd 2-year term by a closer than hoped margin
- Executive Council 3 Democrats to 2 Republicans
 - Oversight on spending and fiscal issues
 - Approves Gubernatorial nominations
 - Oversees long-term planning





New Hampshire Legislature

- Both legislative chamber change control
 - House 230/235 Democrats to 165/170 Republicans
 - Senate 14 Democrats to 10
 Republicans
- Democratic leader Steve Shurtleff of Penacook will take over as Speaker of the House
- Senator Donna Soucy of Manchester is likely to be elected Senate President








New Hampshire sends two Democrats back to Congress

 Incumbent Ann McLane Kuster (D) holds seat vs. Steve Negron (R) in NH-02








Vermont

Blue Supermajorities


Vermont Gov. Scott defeats Democrat Christine Hallquist








Gov. Scott (R) and Sen. Sanders (I) easily win same state







Vermont Legislative Results

- Democrats gain a Supermajority with combined 100 seats won by Democrats and Progressives
- Ability to override Governor Scott vetoes
- Senate Democrats also maintain a supermajority with over 23 of 30 seats
- Strengthens Legislature's negotiating and veto override power with Governor








Ballot Measures & Status Quo


Gov. Baker (R) and Sen. Warren (D) easily win same state








Despite "wave," Mass. Democrats gain only 1 seat in Senate






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Three Massachusetts ballot questions

- #2: Commission on money in politics:
 APPROVED
- #3: Discrimination by gender identity:
 RATIFIED
- "Grand Bargain" took other topics off the table:
 - Minimum wage
 - Paid sick leave
 - "Time-and-a-half" Sunday pay


Gov. Raimondo defeats two Republicans*








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


RI Democrats maintain supermajority in Senate

Intra-Party Leadership Struggles

- 75-seat Democratic House Majority
- House Speaker Mattiello won the informal support of his conference to continue as speaker in 2019 (the formal vote comes in January)
- But 21 current and new House D's voted to oust him as Speaker
- Progressives are pushing for more transparency and power at Mattiello's expense
- Committee Chair positions will be key
