- Your members want you to have insider information and be able to give it to them



- Invite them to deliver contributions and cultivate personal relationships with candidates and members of Congress

## **General PAC Donors**

- General donors also tend to be active in grassroots issues
- Show them you have information and you are trying to get it to them
- These donors might be less concerned about specifics- it is more about showing value and activity

### Senate Math Still Favors Democrats

Donald Trump continues to struggle in the presidential race and the Republicans' hold on the Senate is a precurious position.

Many of the most valuerable Republican senators are dong everything in their power to stare off a ne-decision loss, but Trump appears to be digging holes in some states that are too big for incumbents to overcome. Trump has the unique ability to suppress Republican voters who don't like their presidential choices and galvanise Democratic voters who can't stand the thought of Trump.

There is talk of Republicans casting Trump aside by admitting that presidential default is virtually certain in order to push a message that GOP control of the Senate is imperative to put a "check" on President Hillary Clinton. It's a similar strategy to what Republicans did in 19% when President Bill Clinton had a clear advantage over former Sen. Bob Dole.

But the challenge with duplicating 1994, according to one GOP strategist, is that Dole agreed with the strategy and cooperated. He understood the dynamic of the election and changed his schedule in the final weeks accordingly: It seems unlikely Trump will admit defeat before the election and then work on behalf of other candidates and party he essentially just joined.

There is also a risk that throwing Trump under the bus before Election Day could dry up fundraising to the Republican National Committee, which is funding and organizing the get-out the vote effort in key states since Trump does not have a ground game. The NRSC is vooking with vulnerable senators on turnout as well.








### **General members**

### Dentist Wins GOP Primary Runoff In Georgia's Third District.

The <u>Atlanta Journal-Constitution</u> (7/26, Hallerman) reports that dentist and former West Point, Georgia Mayor Drew Ferguson has defeated state Sen. Mike Crane "in the hotly contested Republican runoff in" the race to succeed

Georgia's third district "stretches from the southeastern Allanta suburbs to the Alabama border," according to the article, which notes that Dr. Ferguson "had the backing of much of Georgia's GOP 'establishment,' including U.S. Sen. Johnny Isakson, former Gov. Sonny Perdue and Westmoreland," as well as the US Chamber of Commerce.
