




Economic recovery swallowed by rapidly growing uncertain environment












Current main risks


















2018 AND 2019: LESS GROWTH THAN EXPECTED 2020: A NEW FRUSTRATION LIKELY POSSIBLE



Focus (F)

IBGE

- Sluggish economic performance, with some industries growing double digit: health, technology, construction
- Pro-business government: reforms as response to grow
- Strong protectionist interests remain in society
- Possibility of leveraging interests through doing business agenda, trade agreements, OECD accession, etc.



KEY TAKEAWAYS

- New leveraging possibilities in probusiness landscape
- Fragmented decision-making underscores need for stakeholdercrafted messaging
- Empowered e-citizens unhappy with institutions and public services
- Business not yet fully taking advantage of PA possibilities. Non-profit organizations leading initiatives.







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
