Number of non-White House and Senate members by race/ethnicity




n his first day as president, Joe Biden issued an "Executive Order on Advancing Racial Equity and Support for Underserved Communities." 

#### **Senate Rules and Norms**

- The Senate runs both on rules and precedents, but there are also many norms.
- While the rules govern the proceedings, it's important to remember how much happens by tradition, like the normal Senate schedule with Tuesday caucus lunches and sessions Monday-Thursday.
- Cooperation is required to complete routine business.

## The Legislative Filibuster

- Democrats are beginning to rally behind reviving the "talking filibuster" which would require senators to stay on the Senate floor to block legislation.
- Another option would be to require 41 senators to affirmatively vote to block legislation, to ensure attendance by the minority party.
- The ultimate endgame would be to use the "nuclear option" to have a majority of senators set a new precedent that only a majority is require to limit debate on legislation.

## So, Then What?

- Senate Minority Leader McConnell has talked of a "scorched earth" approach to Senate operations in response to a Democratic bid to gut the filibuster.
- The Senate still conducts most business by unanimous consent. The question is whether the GOP would really block everything, even naming post offices.
- With a 50-50 Senate there's an added risk of endless quorum calls, since Republicans could theoretically slow Senate business just by staying home.

#### **More Must-Pass Bills**

- The end result might be fewer bills moving, but there would be even more "must-pass" legislation.
- The ability to get desired provisions into a further limited number of omnibus bills may be even more valuable.
- The Senate could also spend even more time on President Biden's nominations, where the process has already been streamlined.
- What happens when a majority of senators disagrees with the majority of the majority? Look at budget vote-a-rama.

# **Budget Resolution**

- Process will likely begin once White House sends its budget request to Congress, but timing on that is not yet determined.
- House and Senate budget committees have a daunting task of writing a tax and spending blueprint that progressives and moderates both support.
- Neither House nor Senate Democrats can afford to lose members during floor votes.
- Democrats will need to debate taxes, discretionary spending and the future of entitlement programs during fiscal year 2022 budget process.
- Democrats plan to include another round of reconciliation instructions in the budget resolution that will likely lead to climate change and infrastructure legislation.

# **Budget Reconciliation**

Subjects: revenue, spending, debt limit

#### Benefits in the Senate

- No need to eliminate or go through 60-vote cloture process
- Ban on non-germane amendments
- Limits debate to 20 hours

#### Byrd rule objections

- Changes to social security
- Changes to revenue or spending that are "merely incidental"
- Increases the deficit outside the 10-year budget window
- Policy is outside the committee of jurisdiction

# **Appropriations Bills**

Committee work will likely begin this summer, but it's unlikely Congress approves all 12 bills before the beginning of the fiscal year on Oct. 1

House and Senate panels expected to have earmarks for first time in a decade

- House Democrats and Republicans plan to participate in process
- Senators have yet to announce how process will return in that chamber

#### Democrats and Republicans have a lot of tense policy issues to address

- Hyde amendment
- Federal grants to local and state law enforcement agencies
- Immigrations and Customs Enforcement and Customs and Border Protection funding levels and oversight language
- Member COLA

# **Debt Limit**

- Congress approved a two-year debt limit extension in August 2019
- Treasury Department will likely use "extraordinary measures" to continue paying the nation's bills and avoiding default into the fall.
- Congress will need to approve another suspension before late fall.
- This will likely trigger a debate about the annual deficit and national debt.





## Case Study - Must-Pass Bills

#### **SASC: NDAA**

- A legislative tank. NDAA is the quintessential annual must-pass bill.
- Closed Committee process makes relationships and preparation key.
- Often plays in other Committee jurisdictions.

#### **Approps**

- In regular order, it's a complex 12-bill powerhouse.
- CRs have recently become the norm, and government funding frequently hangs in the political balance.
- COVID: the era of massive emergency funding bills.

#### HELP: FDA UFAs

- FDA user fee agreements only come around once in a legislative blue moon (every 5 years).
- Unique in that industry and Agency negotiate an agreement, which then turns into a legislative package.
